

Meeting was called to order by President Pete Pettit at 6:03 pm. Pastor Sonnenberg opened with prayer.

Approval of minutes: The minutes of the July 10, 2025 Council Meeting were read (note: there are no August minutes as that council meeting was cancelled). A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as read. Motion was approved by voice vote.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor reminded that discussion of confidential and sensitive matters must be kept confidential.

An exciting new preschool year has started. Pastor will make an effort to meet with each preschool family.

The Clallam Fair booth was very well received with many positive comments. Thanks to Carl and Janis for their leadership.

Council Reports:

President's report (Pete Pettit): No report

Vice-President's report (Leroy Peterson): No report

Board of Elders (Bill Hermann):

The elder serving schedule for October is in place.

Recommended Constitution and Bylaws updates have been given to Leroy.

A poster with elder names and photos is in progress.

Octoberfest is tentatively scheduled for the third week of October.

Planning will start soon for the upcoming Advent season.

Leroy has been appointed as head usher.

It will be requested to add "In Honor of Steven Schlaffman" to the recently erected golf course sponsorship sign. Scott Adolphson will handle this.

Trustee (Dan Smith):

The exterior cross has been repaired. Thanks to Leroy, Scott, and Bill for their contributions to an effective and economical solution.

The washing machine at the 118 rental house has been replaced. The dryer did not need replacing.

Youth & Education (Tim Roberton):

Sunday School will start this week, with Tim leading. Additional volunteers are needed.

The Tuesday Bible and fellowship group continues to go well.

A new volunteer is needed to host game nights.

The new women's Bible study is off to a good start with two study groups.

Fellowship (Peggy Romero): No report

Human Care (Kay Hermann): A \$14,000 grant has been awarded by the Haller Foundation.

Treasurer (Kathy Smith):

Kathy handed out graph reports of Income and Expenses, restricted fund balances, and average Sunday attendance and giving. Attendance was down over the summer months.

The Special Projects Fund includes funds for the sanctuary floor replacement and the fellowship hall carpet replacement.

Evangelism (Janis Deverter): No report

Stewardship (Lynn Vernon):

A new member dinner was held on August 1 with 19 persons in attendance.

The next New Member Sunday is scheduled for September 28.

Subcommittee Reports:

Preschool (Jan Edmunds):

Eleven students are currently enrolled. We can accept up to 16 students.

The Preschool Board will host two dinners a year as fund raisers, the first one in January. All preschool families will be invited.

Belinda is resigning from the Preschool Board in order to volunteer with the Sunday School.

A big thanks to all for your faithful support of the preschool.

Constitution and Bylaws revision (Leroy Peterson): The next meeting is on September 29.

Unfinished Business:

There were 54 persons in attendance at the Pipe Organ dedication. It was an excellent program, enjoyed by all.

The sanctuary hard flooring replacement is moving forward. Carpet replacement in the upstairs area is on hold for now.

Exterior sign update: This project is on hold for now but will be addressed in the near term. We have quotes but less expensive alternatives are being sought.

New Business:

Jan is looking at the various alternatives for renewal of preschool teacher CPR certifications. Depending upon what is available, other persons may be able to join in on this training. Kay will call the fire department to inquire about what they may be able to offer.

Kathy will check if the AED batteries need to be replaced.

Fire extinguishers may need to be inspected.

Brotherhood Mutual, our property insurance provider, recently visited St Matthew and has made the following comments and recommendations:

There is one stair area without a handrail, which does not meet ADA standards.

Existing parking lot damage may be a hazard and should be replaced or repaired. *Pete will inquire with RSI*.

The moss on the roof of one of the rental houses needs to be remediated.

Elders will discuss and establish a good date for Octoberfest at their next meeting.

Trunk or Treat needs a volunteer to lead this important ministry.

Due to the busy Fall schedule, Bill recommended postponing the dog show until the Spring. This was agreed to by consensus. It was noted that the dogs may cause an allergic reaction for some persons.

The next regular quarterly congregational meeting will be September 28. There are no decisions that need to be brought before the assembly, so this will be primarily informational in nature.

Future Business: Additional offering counter volunteers are needed.

Closing: Meeting adjourned at 7:47 pm with closing prayer by Pastor Sonnenberg

A Theology of Suffering for a Self-Obsessed Culture Paul Edwards

Contemporary culture is, in the words of the late author and social critic Christopher Lasch, a "culture of narcissism." Tragically, the American church is not immune to this virus. For today the lifestyles and longings of many modern-day followers of Christ often bear no appreciable difference from that of our non-Christian neighbors and co-workers. At some point during the last quarter century, it became all-too-common to stop proclaiming a gospel directed at people's real spiritual needs and instead focus on the wants and desires of potential church goers. More than mirroring the first century church, this conduct reflects the way Starbucks markets overpriced coffee to potential consumers.

For example, conventional wisdom in evangelicalism today is that suffering is the exception, not the norm for the believer. Moreover, if a Christian does suffer it is quite possibly because of sin in his or her life. Many segments of the American church—immersed in a culture of happy, prosperous consumers—have failed their constituency by not faithfully proclaiming what the Bible says about the reality of suffering. But suffering in the Christian life is the rule, not the exception. From the day Christ called us to follow Him he fully disclosed two prerequisites: denying ourselves and taking up our cross. When Saul of Tarsus was converted on the road to Damascus, he didn't experience a Benny Hinn-esque healing. On the contrary, God blinded him, left him in that condition for days and sent a reluctant evangelist by the name of Ananias to inform him of how much he would suffer for the name of Christ (Acts 9:15-16). And suffer he did. Consider what Paul endured: five times beaten with 39 stripes, three times beaten with rods, stoned, shipwrecked three times, a night and a day floating in the sea, danger of all kinds, weary and in pain, hungry and thirsty, naked and cold. And to add insult to injury God refused to answer his prayer for healing from whatever was ailing him—a thorn in his flesh. Paul was told to be content with grace in the midst of his sufferings (2 Cor. 11-12). How did Paul respond to his sufferings?

I will glory in the things, which concern my infirmities (2 Cor. 11:30).

I am now ready to be offered and the time of my departure is at hand ...henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto them also who love His appearing (2 Tim. 4:8).

The Lord shall deliver me from every evil work, and will preserve me unto his heavenly kingdom: to whom be glory forever and ever! Amen (2 Tim. 4:18).

How could Paul rejoice in his sufferings and give glory to God? The answer lies in a full reading of 2 Timothy 3-4, written in prison just prior to his execution. Note the use of the word "love" five times in these two chapters: lovers of self (3:2); lovers of money (3:2 - "covetous" in some translations); lovers of pleasure (3:4); love his appearing (4:8); loved this present world (4:10). One of the five loves mentioned stands in stark contrast to the other four: *loving the appearing of Jesus Christ*.

When we live in anticipation of seeing Jesus and hearing Him say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: enter into the joy of your Lord," we can endure suffering. Why? Because such a focus helps us realize that the worst thing that happens to us here and now can never separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus. With our focus not on self but Jesus, we more fully realize the truth of 2 Corinthians 4:17: "Our light affliction, which is but for a moment, works for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

The tragedy is that much of contemporary evangelicalism has sold the future and eternal "weight of glory" for the immediate and transient satisfaction of "your best life now." As a result, when Christian's encounter difficulty they are ill-prepared to deal with it biblically: the storms come, the winds blow and "Cultural Christian" is blown away because there is no firm, biblical foundation for life (Matt. 7:24-27).

In Jesus we have a foundation not only for this life, but, for all eternity. Therefore, come what may, the Christian can proclaim, "My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (Ps. 73:26).
