The hymn tune itself is played in the organ pedals, and was composed by Georg Neumark (1621-1681).

About the programme

In 1746, after some three years of building, Zacharias Hildebrandt completed the new three-manual organ of St. Wenzel's Church in Naumburg. It is the largest organ by the »Saxe-Weissenfels Court Organ-builder« and former apprentice to Gottfried Silbermann. In September 1746, the completed instrument was inspected and approved by Silbermann as fellow organ-builder and Johann Sebastian Bach as expert organist and music director of Leipzig.

Although Bach no longer worked as an organist during his time in Leipzig, it was there, from 1723, that some important individual works were composed, including the Preludes and Fugues in B minor, BWV 544, C minor, BWV 546, and E minor, BWV 548, and, later, the works known as the Schübler Chorales, BWV 645–650. The latter are arrangements for organ of arias from the chorale cantatas with a hymn tune as the cantus firmus and which appeared in print in 1747–1748. The highpoint of Bach's organ compositions in Leipzig is his largest collection for organ, Part III of the Clavier-Übung, which appeared in print in 1739. This includes nine organ chorales based on Martin Luther's Kyrie and Gloria hymns (»Kyrie, Gott Vater« and »Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr«) in pedaliter and manualiter versions. Added to these are chorale arrangements of hymns from the Lutheran Catechism. Here, in a plethora of forms and styles, Bach shows just how much compositional potential chorales offer. Framing the 21 organ chorales is the Prelude and Fugue in E flat major, BWV 552.

The workshop is devoted to selected compositions from the above collections, as well as individual works, performed on Zacharias Hildebrandt's Naumburg instrument, which is ideally suited to this repertoire.

- 7) Pete has spoken with RSI about the needed parking lot work; we are waiting for their estimate.
- 8) The filling of Christmas bags for children at the Christmas pageant and Christmas Eve has been started. Kay has little Jesus figures and candy canes to add to these bags.
- 9) Sausage stuffing will occur on December 15.

Corrie ten Boom's Life of Faithfulness

2026 is the 55th anniversary of the publishing of *The Hiding Place* by Corrie ten Boom. Anyone in need of another resolution for the New Year would do well to read (or re-read) this biographical account of a Christian family in the Netherlands who were arrested by the Gestapo during World War II for hiding Jews in their home. Corrie and her sister Betsie were eventually taken to Ravensbrück in Northern Germany, one of the most devastating concentration camps. There, the two endured horrific conditions but also met the miraculous hand of God. Page after page portrays faith even in fearful trembling, and how God can turn all things for His glory. It also highlights a deep commitment to thankfulness by the sisters.

For example, Corrie and Betsie immediately noticed something about Barracks 28, where they were placed. Besides the damp, decaying room with backed up plumbing and single beds piled with several women apiece, there were fleas everywhere. At her breaking point, Corrie asked her sister: "Betsie, how can we live in such a place!" Betsie had Corrie pick up her Bible, which had slipped miraculously past the guards' attention on several occasions, and read from I Thessalonians 5: "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of Jesus Christ—," Corrie read out loud. "That's it, Corrie! That's His answer... we can start right now for thanking God for every single thing about this barracks!" Betsie convinced an indignant Corrie to thank God for the room assignment, for the Bible in her hand, and even for the "crammed, stuffed, packed, suffocating crowds," because that meant more women would hear the Word of God in their darkest hours.

"Thank You," Betsie went on serenely, "for the fleas..." "For the fleas!" This was too much. "Betsie, there's no way even God can make me grateful for a flea." "Give thanks in all circumstances," she quoted. "It doesn't say, 'in pleasant circumstances.' Fleas are a part of this place where God has put us."

And so we stood between the piers and bunks and gave thanks for the fleas.

As time passed, the guards became harsher, and the work more inhumane. However, the guards never came into Barracks 28 at night. Because they were left alone, Corrie and Betsie were able to pull out the contraband Bible and read and evangelize to the women. The sisters discovered later why the guards left these women alone in their quarters: *they were scared of the fleas.*

God's command to be grateful is not arbitrary. Thankfulness changes things. The American Brain Foundation put it this way:

When we feel grateful, neurotransmitters trigger activity in the medial prefrontal cortex, the anterior cingulate cortex, the ventral striatum, and the insula. These brain regions are involved in cognitive functions like higher-order thinking, decision-making, emotional awareness, and motivation.

Being thankful effectively rewires the brain by releasing dopamine and serotonin. Studies have found this can lead to positive outcomes on cardiovascular health and for Alzheimer's patients. It increases our ability to build and keep relationships and brings about many more physical and social outcomes.

Another profound story from *A Hiding Place* had to do with the strip searches the sisters were subject to each Friday. Corrie described lining up with the women of the barracks in a cold hallway, all of whom were chilled to the bone, decrying the need to wait in line naked:

But it was one of these mornings . . . in the corridor, that yet another page in the Bible leapt into life for me. He hung on the cross. I leaned toward Betsie, ahead of me in line. Her shoulder blades stood out sharp and thin beneath her blue-mottled skin. 'Betsie, they took His clothes too.' Ahead of me I heard a little gasp. 'Oh Corrie. And I never thanked Him.'

"In everything, give thanks." That's because we have God to thank for everything, and if we ever forget that, we forget who we are and what life is all about.



The Valleys of Lent series of special services for Lent includes six Biblical sites from which we may derive lessons for the sacred season. Each service looks at a different valley from Scripture that points to something about the suffering Christ endured.

Sin begins to show its ugly results in The Hebron Valley, where the sons of Jacob plot to murder their brother Joseph, reminiscent of Cain and Abel

At The Jordan Valley, about to cross the river into the promised land, we have the opportunity, like Moses, to look back at all the Lord has provided us and to look forward to what God has in store.

March 11 (week 3~Wed.)

The "Valley" of the Winepress

Gideon was hiding from the marauding Midianites in The "Valley" of the Winepress, a poor place to be threshing wheat. From there, God called this unlikely hero to valiant victory.

March 18 (week 4~Wed.)


Every Valley Shall Be Lifted Up
