Some of you may recall my previous articles in the Carillon, which were interrupted in 2024 by my mother's death and my subsequent chores as the executor of her estate. In this article, we will explore my upcoming travels in June to the BachFest in Leipzig, Germany.



The BachFest will include a series of concerts in Thomaskirche and Nikolaikirche (churches in Leipzig's old town). The time frame for the entire trip is June 11-18. Perhaps we'll take a walking tour, visit Bach's tomb, etc. We'll fly direct from SeaTac to Frankfurt, spend 2 nights in Frankfurt to recover, and then take a train to Leipzig.

The organ that was in Thomaskirche during Bach's tenure there is no longer there, having been replaced by a "new" organ around 1889.

One of the events includes a workshop in which I'll have the opportunity to play a pipe organ in the town of Naumberg, nearby to Leipzig. This pipe organ was built in 1746 by an organ builder named Hildebrandt, and was "examined" by J. S. Bach himself upon its completion. This was four years before his death in 1750. The organ has been rebuilt several times since then (as is customary for pipe organs). The organizers of the workshop demand that all the players only play Bach pieces that were composed during his tenure in Leipzig, so I've ordered some new sheet music for that purpose.

This trip is being organized by my friends in the Olympic Peninsula chapter of the American Guild of Organists (AGO) from Kitsap County. They recalled how the late Pat Churchley, of Port Angeles, used to attend the BachFest regularly. I'd known Pat and Phil Churchley since 1961, when my Dad and Phil were on the original Peninsula College start-up faculty. They resided 1 1/2 blocks west of our current house.

I will have to miss one Sunday, June 14th, due to this trip. We can either try to find a substitute organist for that service, or we can train some people on how to operate my "sequencer", an electronic gadget that can play pre-recorded (by me) music on the pipe organ. Please let me know if you're interested in learning about how to be trained to do this.

I took 3 years of German language classes in High School, and met my wife Belinda in "German House" in the UW Haggett Hall dorm (2nd floor, northwest wing), but I still don't think I can converse very well in German!

Meeting was called to order by President Pete Pettit at 6:03 pm. Pastor Sonnenberg opened with prayer.

Approval of minutes: : The minutes of the October 9, 2025 Council Meeting were read. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as read. Motion was approved by voice vote.

Guest comments:

Bob Edmunds spoke briefly about his background in the audio-visual field and stated he appreciates the opportunity to serve at St Matthew.

Bob stated Dan has taken responsibility for the sanctuary sound system, and he will assist and advise as Dan works to replace and upgrade the 30 year old sound system. Bill advised to prioritize quality over cost for this important work.

Live streaming of weekly worship services will resume again with the December 21 Christmas pageant.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor commented that he appreciates everyone's hard work, and made special note of the fair booth and Christmas bazaar as examples of ministry excellence.

Trunk or Treat was a great success, even with moving indoors due to weather.

New Year's Eve worship will be cancelled this year due to the absence of both the pastor and organist.

There will be five new members welcomed this Sunday, and we have recently celebrated four adult baptisms. The current new member class is going very well.

Council Reports:

President's report (Pete Pettit): Pete has met with Pastor on ministry priorities and will work with Dan, Kathy, and Bob on the sanctuary sound system.

Vice-President's report (Leroy Peterson): No report

Board of Elders (Bill Hermann):

Elders are ready for the start of Advent services.

Our communion statement in the bulletin indicates baptism is a requirement for receiving communion. The elders affirm this position but will not deny communion if an unbaptized person presents themselves at the rail.

Board of Elders (Bill Hermann): (cont.)

The elders recommend a 3% salary increase for hourly positions, whether the increase occurs at the start of the calendar year or the start of the church's fiscal year. Pastor requests no pay increase for himself for the upcoming budget year.

New Member Sunday will be November 23. Thanksgiving Eve worship will be Wednesday, November 26, 6:00 pm.

The elders' photo board is finished and posted in the fellowship hall.

Gary Heller has agreed to be assistant usher, under Leroy as head usher.

Altar guild members are asked to review process and procedures for consistency of communion preparation. More non-alcoholic cups are needed in each tray.

Steven is completing his confirmation instruction, but will be allowed and encouraged to continue volunteering as acolyte after his confirmation in January. Additional acolyte volunteers also need to be recruited.

Bill presented a sample chair that will be considered as replacement for the unstable gray chairs. They are restaurant quality and rated for 800 pounds. Cost is \$200 each and we need 12 or 14 chairs.

Trustee (Kathy reporting for Dan Smith):

A cabinet was moved from the narthex into the little chapel. Dan is looking for a new table for the narthex. The little chapel has been cleaned and organized.

The sanctuary hard flooring and trim installation is now complete. The final bill was approximately \$500 more than the estimate, for a final total of approximately \$12,000. Although the congregation previously approved replacement of the sanctuary carpet, we may not proceed at this time due to other priorities and funds availability, pending future congregational decision.

One light on one of the small altar crosses is out and the replacement is no longer available. An electrician is working on a replacement using rope lighting.

One leaky toilet has been fixed.

Youth & Education (Tim Roberton):

Tuesday night Bible study and fellowship continues to go well. The group will start on the Old Testament in the new year.

Game nights are on hold for now.

Sunday School is on hold in December due to everyone's busy schedules. Sunday School may not restart in January without additional volunteer teachers. The current student population averages two to five in attendance, ranging in age from 4 to 13.

Advent devotionals for children and families have been procured.

Fellowship (Peggy Romero):

We need additional volunteers to sign up for the after worship coffee hour.

The bazaar went well, bringing in over \$8,000 to benefit the preschool. Pastor reminded that the community outreach opportunity is more important than the funds raised.

Human Care (Kay Hermann): Kay is waiting for hamburger delivery for upcoming dinners.

Treasurer (Kathy Smith):

Kathy handed out graph reports of Income and Expenses, restricted fund balances, and average Sunday attendance and giving; she also provided budget reports to pertinent individuals.

Restricted fund balances do not reflect the sanctuary flooring payment or Haller Grant deposit, which will be updated in next month's reports. Worship attendance is up slightly from the usual summer slump.

Preschool income is strong with 13 students attending.

Bill requested an *additional graph report showing fiscal YTD income versus expenses.*

A neighbor is parking in our parking lot during the week, but does not use the parking lot on Sunday. It was determined this may not be a problem, but *Pete will speak with them about the issue.*

Evangelism (Carl and Janis Deverter): No report

Stewardship (Lynn Vernon): No report

SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS:

Preschool (Jan Edmunds):

There are currently 13 students enrolled in preschool. We can accept up to 16.

Elizabeth will not return as teacher next year due to her own educational pursuits, and would prefer to scale back now to allow more time to concentrate on her school work.

The move of Trunk or Treat indoors was very well received, and consideration may be given to expanding this to a Harvest Festival next year.

Preschool has sent a thank you to the generous donor for the Luke 2 t-shirts. The preschool children will also make and send their own thank you notes, along with a picture of the children wearing their shirts.

The preschool board is considering holding a thank you dinner for the congregation and preschool families near the end of the school year, possibly as a barbecue or cookout. Pastor requests this be planned for when he is available to attend.

New members are needed for the preschool board, and Jan would especially like to recruit from among our newer church members.

Constitution and Bylaws revision (Leroy Peterson): No report

Unfinished Business:

New AED pads have been ordered in adult and child sizes. The adult pads have arrived but we are still waiting for the child pads.

We have a \$375 credit on the golf course sponsorship, which can be applied to another year's sponsorship. A new sign can include a remembrance of Steven Schlaffman for an additional \$65. The sponsorship includes several free rounds of golf, which was suggested could be used for a raffle. Pastor stated this provides good community visibility, and reminded that Thrivent members may be able to designate funds toward the expense of a new sponsorship year. A motion was made and seconded to approve another year of golf sponsorship, with Scott given first opportunity to underwrite. Motion carried by voice vote. *Pete will speak with Scott to inquire about his interest in renewing the sponsorship.*

The roof moss remediation and stairway hand rail issues are being worked on.

Unfinished Business: (cont.)

Parking lot resurfacing is being worked on. An initial estimate was \$64,000; additional solutions and estimates are being sought.

Kathy stated that the mandatory January 1 minimum wage increase will require an additional \$164 for the six months remaining in our fiscal year budget ending June 30, 2026. This amount is already incorporated into the current budget, so congregational approval of the expense will not be needed. *The required minimum wage increase will be presented as an informational item at the next congregational meeting.*

New Business:

The Christmas pageant will be December 21.

We have a shortage of Bibles for Bible study usage, with only about 14 Bibles available. Pastor prefers the NIV version if additional Bibles are purchased for this purpose.

Bob suggested an audio visual committee be assembled.

The next congregational meeting will be December 28. There are no issues to be voted on but will be informational in nature.

Carl suggested a Men's prayer group be formed, and asked for input and future discussion. This suggestion was well received with much encouragement to proceed.

Future Business: None

Closing: Meeting adjourned at 7:58 pm with closing prayer by Pastor Sonnenberg

Wake Up! Paganism Isn't New, but It Is Rising

We've heard it said lately that what we're seeing in our culture is sin — and that's true. But let's not stop there. What we're seeing is not simply a lack of virtue in a particular political party or a few mentally ill individuals making poor moral choices. What we are witnessing is a culture-wide descent into paganism—the same kind of paganism the prophets condemned in the Old Testament. And mark this: it is not new. Instead, it is ancient and dark. And it is very definable. The prophets—men like Amos, Micah, Habakkuk, and Zephaniah — weren't confused about the character of the nations around them. They saw it plainly.

And under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, they named it in the Bible. Here's what they described and what we're seeing again, right now:

- Bribed Judges: Justice no longer serves truth; it serves power. (**Micah 3:11**)
- Oppression of the Poor: The poor are crushed, while the rich fatten themselves without guilt. (**Amos 5:11**)
- Glorified Violence: Violence and conquest are celebrated as if bloodshed were glorious. (**Habakkuk 1:9-11**)
- Idolatry and Syncretism: Blending false gods with the true God. (**Zephaniah 1:4-6**)
- Luxury without a Conscience: A culture drunk on luxury and intoxicated with substances, escaping reality and numb to sufferings and sins around it. (**Amos 6:4-6**)
- Predatory Leaders: Leaders devour their people; religious leaders sell smooth words for a price. (**Zephaniah 3:3-4**)
- Perverted Justice: A justice system that mocks righteousness and rewards/enables/praises evil. (**Habakkuk 1:4**)
- Persecution of the Faithful: A world that despises the faithful, silences them, calls them dangerous, and kills them. (**Jeremiah 26:11**)
- Breakdown of Family: Betrayal in relationships and dysfunction within the moral anchor of society: the family. (**Micah 7:5-6**)
- Greed: Normalized Theft. (**Micah 2:2**)
- Sexual Immorality: Turning God's gift of sexuality into a selfish tool. (**Amos 2:7**)
- Mockery of the Sacred: Deride and trivialize sacredness. Loss of reverence before God; human dignity is malleable. (**Malachi 1:7-8**)
- Moral Relativism: Everyone does what is right in their own eyes, because objective truth has been thrown into the trash. (**Micah 7:2-4**)

What we are witnessing in America right now is not progress or liberation; it's regression. Indeed, what we see before our eyes is not new. It's very, very old. It is Babylon with a fresh coat of paint. It is Assyria

dressed in digital clothing. It is paganism—raw, unmasked, and celebrated. Let's be honest: this has always been here in the shadows, dormant and tolerated. But now, it's coming out into the open; it is returning. It is manifesting before us. Our culture is not becoming more neutral or secular—it is becoming more pagan. And so, listen up! The problem is not the religion of Christ. It's the religion of self. It is the religion of power. It is the religion of relativism. It is the way of the old gods of paganism. And here's the hard truth: when Christianity is taken for granted, paganism, not neutrality, takes its place.

And here's something else: you can't moan about the state of the culture while turning your back on Christ. You can't cry about injustice, immorality, and chaos while treating the Word and Sacraments like optional extras. You can't complain about pagan darkness while neglecting the Light of the world. You can't dismiss the Church and then wonder why evil fills the void. Wake up out of your spiritual drunken stupor! Cultural outrage without Christian repentance is hypocrisy. Moral panic without worship and catechesis is empty noise. You don't get to treat Christianity as an inconvenience—a nagging cultural relic, outdated and in the way—and then become outraged when paganism pokes through.

So, what now? What shall we do? Repent; return to Christ's Church. That's not a slogan. It's not a sentimental plea. It's the only real answer. Repent—not only of what the culture has become, but of what we have allowed it to become. Repent of what we have ignored. Repent of the ways we have rolled our eyes at Christ and shrugged at His Church, as if Christianity is some inconvenience for the modern man. Repent of thinking articles like this are radical or extreme. Indeed, stop pretending that we can accommodate this darkness and remain unscathed. Stop acting like neutrality is possible. It's not. We don't need more political slogans. We don't need to sanitize paganism with nicer language. We need to return to Christ. To the Word. To the font. To the altar. To the clear, concrete, cruciform reality of Christianity. Christ-crucified or the gods of paganism: wake up because that's the choice. There is no middle ground. See you at church on Sunday.
